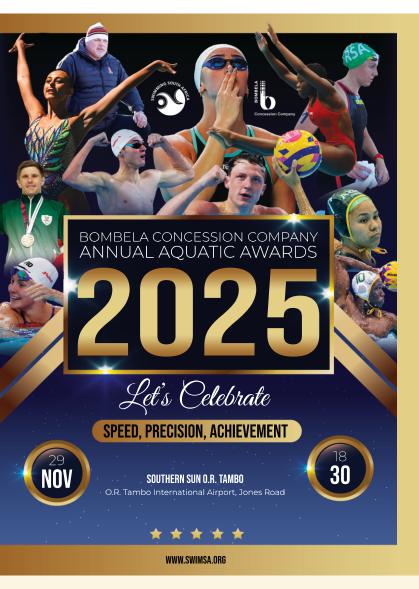






Event Spotlight: A Celebration of Speed, Precision & Achievement

The Southern Sun OR Tambo hotel was the glittering backdrop as South Africa's aquatics family gathered on Saturday night for the **Bombela Concession Company Annual Aquatic Awards 2025**. The event was a powerful tribute to the athletes, coaches, and dedicated volunteers who defined excellence in the past season.



Headline Honours: Swimmers of the Year

The night's top awards celebrated two standout performers on the global stage:

- Pieter Coetzé was crowned Male Swimmer of the Year. His stellar season was highlighted by a trio of backstroke medals at the World Aquatics Championships, including a gold in the 100m event
- Kaylene Corbett earned Female Swimmer of the Year following her breakthrough bronze medal in the 200m breaststroke at the same championships.

Celebrating Excellence Across All Disciplines

True to its name, the awards saluted stars from every corner of the aquatic world:

- Water Polo: Boati Motau and Mitchell Garreau were named Female and Male Players of the Year.
- Para Swimming: Minke Janse van Rensburg (Female) and Christian Sadie (Male) were honoured for their record-breaking seasons.
- Open Water: African champions Callan Lotter (Female) and Connor Buck (Male) took top honours.
- Diving, Artistic Swimming & Promise: Bailey Heydra (Diver), Tayla-Jade van Huyssteen (Artistic Swimmer), and World Junior champion Kris Mihaylov (Most Promising Athlete) were all recognised.

The Pillars Behind the Podium

The awards also honoured the essential team behind every champion:

- Rocco Meiring, the architect behind Coetzé and Corbett's success, was named Coach of the Year.
- TUKS was celebrated as Club of the Year.
- Fish Eagles, led by Gail Bohler, won Club Development of the Year for their community impact.
- Additional awards honoured top administrators, instructors, volunteers, and iournalists.

High Performance (HP) – South Africa's Road to Glory

The Future Is Fast: South Africa's Rising Stars Shine in Belarus

While the aquatics year was celebrated at the glitzy Bombela Awards, the future was being forged in the competition pool in Minsk. A small but formidable four-swimmer South African team has just returned from the **Strongest Athletes Swimming Cup in Belarus** with a hugely promising six-medal haul.

The short course meet served as a perfect proving ground for young talent. **Scarlett le Roux** (17) made a stunning senior international debut, claiming silver in the 800m freestyle and bronze in the 400m freestyle, both in new personal best times. Equally impressive was **Matthew Caldwell**, who powered to three bronze medals across the 400m, 800m, and 1500m freestyle events, breaking the 15-minute barrier in the latter. Sprint star **Jessica Thompson** added another bronze in the 50m freestyle, while **Jarden Eaton** delivered a series of personal bests.

"This was my first time racing against Europeans... and the medals were a complete surprise," said a delighted Scarlett le Roux. "I learned so much from my teammates... I truly think their guidance played a huge role." The team's success, achieved with several swimmers in heavy training, is a clear signal of the rising talent and depth within the South African system, proof positive that the foundation for **LA 2028 and beyond** is being laid today.

Kate Allwood showcased determination by smashing PBs in every event she contested.

A Spotlight on Leadership Making Waves on the Global Stage: Tadhg Slattery's **Deaflympics Success**

While South African athletes were breaking records in the pool at the Tokyo Deaflympics, one of our own was making a different kind of splash behind the scenes. Tadhg Slattery, serving as the ICSD (International Committee of Sports for the Deaf) Swimming Director, played a pivotal role in ensuring the swimming competition was a resounding success.

In this crucial position, Slattery worked directly with the Japan Organising Committee's swimming team for months to prepare the iconic Tokyo Aquatics Centre. The results were nothing short of spectacular. His dedication was so evident that a member of the Japan board was left in awe. remarking on the venue's stunning transformation. ICSD President Adam Kosa praised Slattery directly, telling him he was "doing a brilliant job."

Reflecting on the challenge before his first major technical meeting with 41 nations, Slattery shared: "I have gained good experience and faced many challenges... This afternoon at 17:00, I will have my first Technical Meeting with 41 countries attending. Wish me luck.

His leadership ensured the venue was not just ready but was hailed as the best swimming venue at the Deaflympics Games, providing a world-class stage for athletes like Mark Roach and Terence Parkin to shine.

This achievement underscores the deep well of administrative and technical expertise within the South African aquatics community. Congratulations to Tadhg on this fantastic accomplishment – you have represented South Africa with immense distinction on the global sporting stage.

Belarus Swimming Cup: A Six-Medal Statement

Our young stars made a powerful statement in Minsk, returning with a six-medal haul that signals a bright future.

The team's success was built on versatility and resilience. Matthew Caldwell emerged as a powerhouse, claiming three bronze medals in the demanding 400m, 800m, and 1500m freestyle events. Scarlett le Roux announced herself on the senior international stage with a silver in the 800m free and a bronze in the 400m free, both in new personal best times. Sprint specialist Jessica Thompson added a bronze in the 50m freestyle.

The team's depth was further proven by strong performances from Jarden Eaton, who set multiple PBs and narrowly missed the podium, and a competitive 5th-place finish in the mixed freestyle relay.

Team South Africa asserted its strength in open water swimming, dominating the inaugural Africa Cup in Guinea with a series of commanding performances.

The team's prowess was on full display across all distances. Callan Lötter was in a class of her own, striking gold in both the 5km and 3km knockout events. Sven Van Der Linde and Hannah Neilson provided excellent support, each securing silver in both individual races.

The squad saved its best for last, as the quartet of Van Der Linde, Neilson, Clayton Kassebaum, and Lötter powered to a gold medal in the Mixed Relay with a decisive time of 25:33.6, capping off a perfect team performance.

The Path Forward: Rebuilding Our Foundation

We want to share important updates regarding the Todswim program, which has faced challenges and taken a backseat in recent activities. Recognising its role as the **foundational basis for all other swimming disciplines**, the E&T team has held several meetings with a dedicated core group to strategise a comprehensive restructuring.

Our primary goals are to reunite all qualified Todswim teachers and assist those unable to complete the course due to obstacles like the inability to log practical hours – a issue stemming from a limited number of accredited assessors. We also acknowledge the limitations in course offerings and essential workshops across affiliates.

The rescheduled conference in mid-2026 will be geared towards addressing these challenges, outlining alternative pathways for course completion, and providing valuable professional development. We encourage all Todswim teachers and trainees to stay engaged. Together, we can revitalise this vital initiative and strengthen its role within our swimming community.
